Introduction

The Criminal Justice Department offers a Minor in Criminal Justice, a one year Certificate in Criminal Justice Management, a one year Certificate in Legal Assistant/Paralegal, an Associate of Applied Science with a pathway to Criminal Justice, an Associate of Applied Science in Legal Assistance and Paralegal, a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice and a Master of Science degree in Criminal Justice including an M.S. Criminal Justice degree completely online. The curriculum is both broad and flexible enough to permit students to pursue course work in a wide variety of criminal justice topics cutting across law enforcement, courts, corrections, research and policy analysis, and planning operations.

Students are encouraged to take internships in criminal justice and/or human service agencies. The Department of Criminal Justice has also established two plus two programs that permit students at selected two-year colleges to transfer to the baccalaureate program at Albany State University without the loss of credit. Credits from other state institutions are transferable also. The program is multi-disciplinary in nature and incorporates courses from psychology, sociology, political science and law.

Mission

The Mission of the Albany State University Department of Criminal Justice is to forge strategic links between criminal justice and Forensic Science agencies, academic research, education of the students, and promotion of justice. This provides for enhancement of criminal justice agencies, criminal justice research, and students' education. Service to the community, development of students, and the advancement of criminal justice are the goals of the Institute. The Institution's Mission and goal completion will be advanced by its continuing commitment to quality education, service to criminal justice professionals and the community, and the continued development of the Institute through research and modernization.

Facility

The Department is located in the Catherine Marie Hartnett Building. The building is a state of the art facility with an auditorium that seats 150 people, a computer lab, satellite hook up for distance learning, mock courtroom, forensic science laboratories, student lounge, and modern classrooms and offices. Ample student parking is available and the building is accessible to students with disabilities. The campus library, bookstore, student activity center, and track are all within short walking distance from the Criminal Justice Building.

Admissions Requirements

Admission applications should be turned in no later than July 1 for students wishing to attend fall semester. In terms of financial aid and admittance to the university the earlier the process is initiated the better.
