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Executive Summary

International Education Week (IEW) is an annual event that is cerebrated globally to mark the importance of international education to individuals, societies, and institutions. At Albany State University (ASU), it is a time to showcase all programs and activities that reflect our mission statement and commitment to prepare students as global citizens of the 21st century. The 2012 International Education Week provided us an opportunity to create awareness about the importance of international education and the need to realize one of ASU's strategic goals of being a leader in community and global engagement.

The main objective of the 2012 program was to exhibit all we do to promote international education- study abroad programs, internships abroad, and to share with students, faculty, staff members and the community information about over forty international countries represented at Albany State University. The IEW activities lasted for four days starting October 8-12. The general attendance to all events was over 600 people.

The first event was the International Field Day, which featured children from Albany Early Learning Center participating in international games which, included indoor soccer and other games that help them exercise for good health as well as relate with games that are not commonly played in the USA environment. This event ties in with the 2012 State Department theme, which is "International Education: Striving for a Healthier Future Worldwide." "The event is also a reminder for everyone to put children on the path towards a healthy future, so that they can "excel on the world stage in whatever career choice they make" (Arne Duncan, 2012). Without good health there is no future for our young ones. The Dorm Competition also took place on Monday October 8. Albany State University has 10 housing units which house over 1700 students. Each housing unit selected a country of its choice and was responsible for gathering facts about the country, and exhibiting the country's culture in creative ways through dorm decorations and food preparation. A panel of judges made up of faculty and administrative staff members toured the housing units to determine the winners. The criteria for assessment were creativity, presentation of facts, use of resources, and overall presentation. Hall 5, representing the Bahamas, was the winner of the 2012 Dorm Competition.

The rest of the events: the key note address from the renowned Sgt Juana De Los Santos, the student–faculty panel discussion on "Diversity" and the Cultural Explosion featuring study abroad stands, various country cultures, music, and international flavors were all outcomes of efforts to integrate international education into all aspects of the institution's core functions. These international education events reflect the quality and attributes of ASU faculty, staff, and students in regards to the global diversity of the 21st-century society.

The result of the program assessment survey from 452 attendees showed high appreciation of all events held during the International Education Week. The Cultural Explosion was ranked as the number one event, and it also was recorded as the most attended event.






"In what ways might our experiences, beliefs, and emotional perceptions play an unconscious role on how we judge others who belong to other ethnic groups?"

This is one of several questions Albany State University students, faculty, and staff pondered during the International Education Week (IEW) panel discussion. This year's Student and Faculty Panel Discussion theme was Issues in Diversity. Faculty panelists included Dr. Sandra Handwerk, M.P.A; Dr. Judith Rosenbaum-Andre, Mass Communication, and Mr. Mark Hankerson; English. Delvon Lewis, ASU First Royal Gentlemen was the student panelist. The moderator was Ms. Maggie Emily, The Office of Global Programs.

The moderator opened the discussion with the ground rules: participants were encouraged to speak out and share their own experiences with diversity. She encouraged students, especially, to speak up, as they rarely have the chance to debate with faculty. Over 60

students and faculty and staff filled the James Pendergrast Library Auditorium for the two-hour event. Participants shared their own struggles with diversity. Regional, racial, and class issues were discussed in a lively forum. Participants deliberated on how to define race and discussed racial and regional stereotypes they face every day.

That same year Private First Class De Los Santos reported to Marine Helicopter Squadron 361 and deployed to Okinawa, Japan.



In July 2004, Lance Corporal De Los Santos deployed to Al-Asad Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom 2-2 where she was promoted to Corporal. After a successful tour with HMH-361 she then reported to MALS-16 in September 2005. In July 2006, Sergeant De Los Santos deployed to Al-Asad Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom 5-7 where she held the billet of Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of the MALS-16 IMRL program. In January 2008, she redeployed to Al-Asad Iraq and upon return was transferred to Marine Helicopter Squadron One, Quantico, VA.







Background - The ASU Foundation Study Abroad Scholarship (AFSAS) program was created in spring 2011 to help ease the financial burden on students who are interested in experiencing study abroad. The first five recipients for the AFSAS award received \$1000 each to study abroad in Costa Rica, Trinidad and Tobago, England and Spain in summer of 2011.

Requirements – eligible applicants must be enrolled at ASU as either full-time or part-time students who have made application to a recognized Board of Regents accredited Study Abroad program listed at ASU or in the University System of Georgia Study Abroad Catalogue. You can find the catalog at either http://www.usg.edu/oie/catalog/ or here at the Office of Global Programs-"Study Abroad" stand.

Available funding – The total dollar amount available annually to fund study abroad is determined by the ASU Foundation Advisory Board or the Vice President for Institutional Advancement, and is awarded on a competitive and first-come first-served basis. Students who will benefit must be participating in a USG-sanctioned study abroad program, and should submit formal application timely to the Office of Global Programs using the application form.

Deadlines: The completed application form must be submitted to The Office of Global Programs by January 31, 2013. Recipients of AFSAS aid will receive notification of the amount awarded to each of them by March 15, 2013.

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
